Airport Authori ty hears State of the Airp

Record fuel sales and operations were noted in the annual report

MOUNT VERNON — The Mount
Vernon Airport Authority Board of Commissioners recently heard the State of the Airport report for fiscal year 2023-2024, which showed record-setting fuel sales and operations at the facility.

at the facility.

According to the annual report, nearly 160,000 gallons of aviation fuel was sold in FY 2023/2024. The exact total, 157,368 gallons, set a new record for the airport in the modern era (post 2000). The prior fiscal year's total was 139,991 gallons, Sentinel archives state. For the 23-24 year, Corporate Aircraft Association (CAA) member aircrafts—those only stopping for aircrafts — those only stopping for quick turn fuel services — accounted

for roughly 22% of total annual sales.
"I'm super proud of the team for

achieving that goal," said Airport Director Chris Collins. "I set a goal of 150,000 gallons of fuel at the beginning of the fiscal year. ... We have a great team and everybody's pulling their weight and they're dedicated to what they do, and that's taking care of our customers/visitors."

our customers/visitors."
Mount Vernon Outland Airport also saw a record year in calendar year 2023 for total operations, jet opera-tions and CAA stops. During the year, there were 29,802 total aircraft operations, slightly higher than the previ-ous year's count of 28,845. There were

also 376 jet oper-ations, 16 more than the previous record set in 2022. In addition, there were 308 CAA stops, solidly ahead of the 2022 total of 256, the report states. "Credit goes

aviation events such as MLSA Expo, restaurant traffic, CAA and many other factors related to Team MVN," Collins stated in the report.
Also during the fiscal year, the Illinois Department of Transportation,

Division of Aeronautics Airport of the Year (Large General Aviation Category) Award was presented to Mount Vernon Outland Airport last September. Airport officials accepted the award at the Illinois Public Airports Conference in Galena.

Furthermore last fiscal year, four new private pilot certificates (including EAA Chapter 1155's first James C. Ray Scholar Nekoda Colvin), one new sport pilot certificate and two instrument ratings were achieved at the airport. Also, nine solo flight occurrences were celebrated.
